What is Social Enterprise?

a business with primarily social objectives, whose surpluses are principally reinvested for that purpose in the business or community rather than mainly being paid to shareholders or owners



Social Enterprise in UK

- 62,000 social enterprises
- Different structures
 - Enterprising Charities,
 - voluntary organisations,
 - Community Interest Companies,
 - Co-operatives and mutual structures
 - private companies with social objectives and profit distribution

- Model 1 Engage in a trading activity that has no direct social impact, make a profit, and then transfer some or all of that profit to another activity that does have direct social impact
- Model 2 Engage in a trading activity that does have direct social impact, but manage a trade-off between producing financial return and social impact
- Model 3 Engage in a trading activity that not only has direct social impact, but also generates a financial return in direct correlation to the social impact created


